PAST EVENTS

- **WORKSHOP ON EMOTIONS**

Turin (Italy), May 10, 2000 (Language: Italian).

The workshop on passions, emotions and affects was organized by the Department of Philosophy of the University of Turin (chair of Philosophy of Language; cf. <http://hal9000.cisi.unito.it/wf/DIPARTIMEN/Discipline1/Convegni--/emozioni.htm> [cvt.htm](http://hal9000.cisi.unito.it/wf/DIPARTIMEN/Discipline1/Convegni--/English-programme.htm) for the abstracts; and <http://hal9000.cisi.unito.it/wf/DIPARTIMEN/Discipline1/Convegni--/English-programme.htm> [cvt.htm](http://hal9000.cisi.unito.it/wf/DIPARTIMEN/Discipline1/Convegni--/English-programme.htm) for the English program) and aimed at analyzing passions, emotions and affects from different perspectives (philosophical, pragmatological, semiotical, phonetical, philological). In the morning session, after the introduction of Carla Bazzanella (Univ. of Turin), the following lectures were held: Remo Bodei (Univ. of Pisa), Emotions and aesthetic experience; Clotilde Calabi (Univ. of Milan), Emotional qualia; Claudia Caffi (Univ. of Genoa), Steps towards a pragmatics of emotive communication; Patrizia Violi e Gabriele Pallotti (Univ. of Bologna), The semantics of emotions.

The afternoon session included: Emanuela Magno Caldognetto (Univ. of Padua), Phonetic correlates of emotions; Alessandro Garcea (Univ. of Turin), Passions in ancient thought: A journey through Cicero's *Tusculanae disputationes*; Italo Sciuto (Univ. of Verona), Passions in medieval thought; Pietro Kobau (Univ. of Turin), The psychology of emotionless motivation - From Wolff to Dennett.

The main topics which were discussed were the following: taxonomic problems and the use of evaluation/potency/activity dimensions; the correlations between emotions and physiological and/or phonetic variations; the revision of the ancient (and sometimes modern) concept of emotions as anomalous and negative; the relationships between cognition and emotions, qualitative states and causal roles; the influence of literacy on the categorization of emotions.

Despite the tight schedule, there was enough time to debate on each paper; furthermore, in the general discussions after each session all the participants exchanged their views in a very stimulating and open atmosphere.

RATIONALITY IN ACTION

(John Searle, University of California, Berkeley)

Abstract of the lectures:

In this series of lectures I will discuss a certain conception of rationality that is most powerfully articulated by David Hume, but reaches its contemporary formulation in welfare economics and decision theory. I will argue that this conception is radically at fault. It describes only special cases. The essence of rationality, as Kant saw, is in the exercise

of human freedom. But how is any such freedom possible? There is a gap between the reasons for our actions and the performance of the actions. Given the presupposition of freedom, we can explain the creation of, and motivating force of, desire-independent reasons. The possibility of freedom and the coherence of the self requires a certain conception of consciousness and brain function. I will discuss these issues in light of contemporary neurobiological research.

- **MODERNITY & MORAL IDENTITY**

17-19 August 2000, University of Helsinki, Finland.

The purpose of this international and multidisciplinary conference is to discuss the interplay between ethics and the discourse of modernity in various fields. There will be plenary sessions with keynote lectures as well as parallel workshops. Keynote Speakers include: Ass.Prof. Marina Barabas (Dept. of Philosophy, Charles University, Prague), Prof. Craig Calhoun (Dept. of Sociology, New York University), Prof. Martha Nussbaum (Dept. of Philosophy, Brown University), Dr. Nicholas Rengger (Dept. of International Relations, University of St. Andrews), Prof. Suresh Sharma (Centre for the Study of Developing Societies, Delhi), Prof. Gunnar Skirbekk (Dept. of Philosophy, University of Bergen), Prof. Georg Henrik von Wright (Dept. of Philosophy, University of Helsinki) will also take part in the discussions. The working language of the conference is English.

THEMATIC CONTEXT: The revival of ethics and the rising interest in the discourse of modernity and postmodernity are among the most notable features of recent philosophy and social theory. In several of the most influential philosophical contributions to have appeared during the last two decades the interests in ethics and modernity converge.

The convergence is manifest not only in Charles Taylor's and Richard Rorty's recent work, in Jürgen Habermas' discourse ethics and in Michel Foucault's last books and writings, but also in the contributions by such diverse authors as Seyla Benhabib, Jacques Derrida, Hans-Georg Gadamer, Axel Honneth, Julia Kristeva, Alasdair MacIntyre, Martha Nussbaum, John Rawls, Paul Ricoeur, Michael Sandel, Michael Theunissen, Ernst Tugendhat, Michael Walzer and many others. In many of the most important recent contributions to social and political theory, too - by Zygmunt Bauman, Ulrich Beck, Pierre Bourdieu, Craig Calhoun, Nancy Fraser and Anthony Giddens to mention a few - moral categories and considerations are foregrounded. The questioning of modernity now increasingly focuses on the specificity of the moral horizon of modern times, the central notion being that of moral identity. The significance and implications of this recent moral turn in the discourse of modernity have, however, not yet been assessed in depth. In moral philosophy the reciprocity with the discourse of modernity has led to a fundamental reorientation of both scope and purpose. The metaethical focus of early post-war analytic moral philosophy is giving way to a discourse in which authors search for an understanding of the conditions for the formation of moral identity characteristic of our times. The old debates in modern moral philosophy about the meaning and conditions of self-determination (autonomy) and self-realization have been invigorated, and have received new dimensions within the discourse of modernity and postmodernity - not least in the controversies over the "end of man", the inextricable social dimension in the constitution of moral identity, and in the historicity of rationality. In this context essential diagnostic information is provided by social theory. Highly relevant are, e.g., studies concerning the cultural and social implications of technological change, of increasing functional differentiation and global integration, and of the rise of multicultural societies. Similarly, there is the thesis that work and nationality are losing their significance as pillars of identity. At the same time, the recently reawakened interest in ethics and its controversies feed back into the major debates in social and political theory, as witnessed in an exemplary manner in the so-called liberalism-communitarianism debate.

AIMS OF THE CONFERENCE: The purpose of the conference is to bring together contributions to and assessments of the interplay between moral philosophy and the discourse of modernity in various fields. We invite proposals under the following themes: * The moral horizon of modernity: critical assessments of recent debates and new diagnostic contributions; * The tasks and limits of the theories of modernity; * Profiles of contemporary contributors to the discourse of modernity; * Modernity and rationality; * Notions of modernity in different disciplines and fields.

1. Lazare BENAROYO

Fondation René Chassot pour l'éthique médicale,

Institut d'Histoire de la Médecine, Lausanne

Fondements phénoménologiques de l'éthique médicale : temporalité, narrativité et herméneutique
(séminaire spécifique)

“ Il ne peut y avoir homogénéité et uniformité d'attention et d'attitude envers la maladie et envers le malade, (...) la prise en charge d'un malade ne relève pas de la même responsabilité que la lutte rationnelle contre la maladie. ” Ces propos de G. Canguilhem laissent entrevoir les difficultés épistémologiques suscitées par l'approche médico-scientifique contemporaine de l'homme souffrant ; ils mettent en exergue la nécessité d'opérer une “ réduction ” méthodologique autre que celle des sciences expérimentales, dès lors qu'il s'agit de démasquer l'envergure éthique de la relation clinique. S'appuyant sur une épistémologie critique de la pratique médicale, le séminaire va se pencher sur les travaux de Ed. Husserl, M. Heidegger, M. Merleau-Ponty, P. Ricoeur et E. Lévinas en vue d'esquisser une anthropologie phénoménologique de la relation à l'homme souffrant, portant une attention particulière aux catégories de temporalité, de narrativité et de responsabilité pour autrui. A la lumière des travaux de Ricoeur, il sera notamment suggéré qu'une approche herméneutique venant se greffer sur la perspective phénoménologique peut servir de guide à l'élaboration d'une éthique de la relation de soin faisant écho aux exigences de l'art thérapeutique.

2. Raphaël CÉLIS & Fabio MERLINI

Département de philosophie, Lausanne

Le développement des neurosciences et la question de l'humain dans l'homme.

(séminaire spécifique)

Les nouvelles sciences du vivant et les découvertes récentes sur le fonctionnement du cerveau obligent la philosophie à s'expliquer avec un “ biologisme ” d'un genre nouveau. Dans son dialogue avec E. Changeux, l'auteur de l'“ homme neuronal ”, P. Ricoeur nous livre les instruments conceptuels nécessaires à cette explication. Sur la base de cet ouvrage, mais en référence également aux auteurs de la “ philosophy of mind ” tels que Pascal Engel, nous tenterons dans ce séminaire de débattre des enjeux de ce dossier lourd de conséquences.

3. Jacques GASSER & Bernard ANDRIEU

Institut d'Histoire de la Médecine, Faculté de Médecine, Lausanne ;

IUFM de Lorraine, Nancy

Les cerveaux de l'homme

(séminaire spécifique)

Les différents modèles utilisés par les auteurs intéressés par le fonctionnement du cerveau au cours des deux siècles passés sont multiples. Ce séminaire tentera une typologie de ces modélisations à travers la lecture critique et commentée de textes. Lors de chaque séance deux textes seront abordés, l'un du XIX^e siècle l'autre du XX^e siècle permettant pour chaque modèle d'établir des analogies, les conditions d'éventuels déplacements sémantiques de son renouvellement ou à l'inverse de sa permanence.

4. Bernardino FANTINI

Institut Romand d'histoire de la Médecine et de la Santé, Genève

Le concept d'individu en biologie et en médecine

(séminaire spécifique)

La structure théorique de la biologie et de la médecine se fonde sur des antinomies fondamentales qui s'opposent et qui se complètent : structure – fonction, âme – corps, self – not self, maladie – santé, vie – mort. Parmi ces antinomies fondamentales, il y a celle entre individu et population, qui est centrale dans notre être biologique, car cette dynamique détermine l'évolution par sélection naturelle, et celle entre individuel et collectif, car la relation individu – collectivité est à la base entre autre de la relation clinique et des politiques de santé publique.

L'analyse philosophique montre que le terme *individualité* garde deux racines étymologiques : a) *in-dividuum* – une entité non divisible, une intégrité ; b) *individuel*, qui appartient à l'individu, par rapport à des caractères partagés par un ensemble. L'identité est l'ensemble des caractères ou des circonstances qui permettent de distinguer un individu ou un objet des autres de la même espèce ou classe, comme l'individualité d'un phénomène ou d'un objet est ce qui constitue son caractère propre et original.

Par conséquent, la méthode des sciences biologiques et médicales se fonde sur une double procédure :

1. découvrir et définir les invariants, ce qui amène au concept d'identité absolue d'un objet ou d'un processus.
2. découvrir et cerner la variabilité, base du concept d'individualité. Cette recherche des invariants et de la variabilité se réalise en médecine dans deux lieux distincts et complémentaires : la clinique hospitalière et les laboratoires. La médecine, afin de devenir scientifique, objective, devient impersonnelle, car elle recherche les invariants, les phénomènes généraux, communs, au delà de la variabilité individuelle mise en évidence par la clinique. La tension essentielle entre la médecine fondamentale et la médecine clinique, qu'on retrouve dans l'organisation sociale de la pratique et de l'enseignement médical, a son origine dans la diversité des domaines et des attitudes faces à la maladie et au malade. La clinique insiste sur la variabilité, sur l'individualité, sur le malade singulier, plutôt que sur la maladie (“ il n'y a pas des maladies, il n'y a que des malades ”). Par contre, dans les grands hôpitaux, dans les laboratoires cliniques comme dans les pratiques hygiéniques et de santé publique, la maladie acquiert un statut ontologique, devient une entité indépendante, qu'on peut espérer combattre et à la limite éliminer.

Le patient individuel reste à l'intersection entre nature, science et histoire clinique. Les trois dimensions sont également nécessaires non seulement pour la pratique mais aussi pour la connaissance. L'intuition clinique n'est finalement que la capacité d'appliquer des connaissances générales à l'histoire de malades particuliers, ici et maintenant. A l'inverse, les histoires individuelles rassemblées par le médecin sont à la source d'une connaissance spécifiquement médicale ; celle-ci est donc dans sa nature profonde une science historique.

L'individualité est donc une notion complexe qui ne s'épuise pas dans sa seule dimension éthique ou sociologique. L'individualité du patient, valeur essentiel de la dimension éthique de la médecine, est également une valeur par sa dimension épistémologique.

5. Roberta DE MONTICELLI

Département de philosophie, Genève

Personne et individualité. Recherches pour une théorie phénoménologique.

(séminaire spécifique)

Une connaissance de l'individuel est-elle possible ? Il semble que oui, si nous connaissons Jean ou Pierre mieux que Jacques. Se réduit-elle à la perception sensorielle ? Il semble que non, pour la même raison. Comment devrait-on donc décrire une telle connaissance ? Une épistémologie de la connaissance de l'individuel suppose-t-elle une ontologie de l'individualité ?

La tradition phénoménologique nous livre quelques esquisses d'ontologie ainsi que d'épistémologie de ce que nous appellerons *l'individualité essentielle*, c'est à dire une manière d'être un individu qui est exemplifiée par les personnes, mais aussi par d'autres classes d'individus (œuvres).

Nous étudierons les fondements d'une théorie de l'individualité, du point de vue ontologique ainsi que de celui épistémologique. Nous essayerons de montrer que le débat contemporain sur la naturalisation de l'esprit roule autour de la catégorie de subjectivité, tout en négligeant entièrement la catégorie d'individualité, qui s'avère plus profonde du point de vue ontologique.

6. Bernard RORDORF

Faculté Autonome de Théologie Protestante, Genève

Phénoménologie de la différence sexuelle

(séminaire non-spécifique)

La différence sexuelle n'a jamais joué un rôle majeur dans la compréhension de l'humain, ni pour la tradition philosophique, ni pour la tradition théologique. Quand l'humanité n'a pas été conçue sur le modèle masculin, elle l'a été à partir du sujet conçu comme centre autonome d'activité. Pourtant, l'humanité est radicalement mixte : la différence sexuelle ne manifeste pas seulement le caractère relationnel de l'humain, mais aussi l'achèvement de l'humain en tout être humain

7. Vincent BARRAS

Institut d'Histoire de la Médecine, Lausanne

Histoire des principaux concepts de la maladie psychique,

de l'Antiquité au XVIIIe siècle

(séminaire spécifique)

Le séminaire vise à donner lecture, et à commenter, quelques textes significatifs de l'histoire de la philosophie et de la médecine portant sur les concepts fondamentaux par lesquels l'on a cru que les Anciens pouvaient appréhender la maladie psychique depuis l'Antiquité : manie, mélancolie, phrénésie, fureur, léthargie. L'interprétation, faisant essentiellement appel à des méthodologies de type historique, sera axée autour de deux questions, reliées l'une à l'autre : celle d'une part des conditions historiques de possibilité, pour nous, de lire dans ces états anciens les traits d'une éventuelle permanence de la maladie psychique, celle enfin de la continuité des termes, des constellations sémantiques et des usages qui leur sont associés, de l'Antiquité grecque jusqu'au XVIIIe siècle (et pour certains d'entre eux, jusqu'à nos jours).

8. Alain DE LIBERA

Département de philosophie, Genève

L'Intentionnalité dans la philosophie médiévale

(spécifique)

C'est F. Brentano qui, dans un emprunt conscient à la scolastique, a introduit le terme "intentionnalité" dans le vocabulaire de la psychologie (c.f. *La Psychologie au point de vue empirique*, trad. M. de Gandillac, Paris, 1944, p. 102). C'est de cette initiative que dépendent les reprises du terme et du concept dans la psychologie intentionnelle et la phénoménologie. L'objet du séminaire est de retracer les étapes médiévales d'une généalogie des notions brentaniennes et post-brentaniennes d'intentionnalité. Le latin scolastique *intentio* présente une palette de sens d'une grande richesse.

On peut, en effet, traduire le terme par : 1/ attention, 2/ visée, but, propos, 3/ relation, rapport, 4/ image, copie, ressemblance, similitude, 5/ représentation, notion, concept, 6/ forme intelligible, 7/ similitude extra-mentale. La polysémie d'*intentio* a été analysée par Duns Scot, qui la ramène à quatre acceptions principales : a/ acte volontaire, b/ notion formelle réelle (*ratio formalis in re*), c/ concept, d/ orientation vers un objet (*ratio tendendi in obiectum*). Le séminaire proposera donc un parcours ordonné dans la littérature philosophique médiévale suivant les quatre domaines indiqués par Duns Scot. Parmi les auteurs étudiés figureront : Averroès, *Grand commentaire sur le De anima*, Thomas d'Aquin, choix de textes, Pierre-Jean Olieu [Olivi], *Quaestiones in II librum Sententiarum*, Duns Scot, *Ordinatio*, II, d. 13, Guillaume d'Occam, *Somme de logique*. Une traduction française des documents abordés sera fournie à chaque séance.

Works of art are cognitive devices aimed at the production of rich cognitive effects. Thus it can be argued, in the light of what is known about human cognition, that aesthetic experience is a by-product of the exercise of more fundamental cognitive faculties such as perception and imagination. Works of art, on this view, are never grasped directly. Rather, in an aesthetic experience, a subject directly perceives a certain object or event (a canvas, a display of pixels, a series of sounds), and this perception gives rise to a cognitive activity of a special, aesthetic type. Theories of art should thus address questions about the interplay of the cognitive faculties. Papers are invited on all aspects of the relation between perception, imagination, the emotions, and aesthetic experience, and on the way in which findings in cognitive science can shed new light on art, its appreciation, and its evaluation.

- **A FIELD GUIDE TO THE PHILOSOPHY OF MIND**

Philosophy of mind and the philosophical issues arising in the allied domain of cognitive sciences constitute a fast developing territory, which is very well introduced by a number of excellent web resources (see our choice at RECOMMENDED LINKS section). In the hope not just to follow the stream, but to be interestingly complementary to them, more focused views of specific regions will be supplied here. We call them GUIDED TOURS, each being an in depth exploration of a particular topic that comprises two parts: 1) a preliminary state-of-the-art report on the issue, which explains what the question is, how it arises and what ramifications result from it; how the debate goes on with all the theories, objections, proposed solutions, etc. 2) a bibliographical guide to the relevant literature, which consists of copiously annotated items. Such a bibliography does not aim at an abstract completeness, but it should reasonably cover all the material worth mentioning, or at least what so seems in the opinion of the author. As it is in the 'field guide' genre, the reader is provided with helpful signposts by experienced authors, but is encouraged to eventually take his own path. In the continuous effort of enlarging and keeping them updated, the 'tours' will be always in progress. Annotated items can be individually searched in the DATABASE section, where they are listed by AUTHORS and by TITLES.
